Presentations and Workshops

We have some exciting presentations and workshops coming up. In November, Kathryn Schmidt, author of Rule Breaking Quilts will be joining us for a lecture/trunk show and workshop. Kathy has been a



quilter for over 35 years and is still excited by all the possibilities of her art. Kathy's workshop is on Tuesday, November 30, 2021. She will be teaching us her rule-breaking approach to quilting she calls "Quilting Improv Style". Kathy tells us: Be bold! Be brave! Put down your ruler and attack your fabric armed only with a rotary cutter and a sense of adventure. Experiment with curvy shapes and pointy points and extreme fabric choices and fear none of them. You will end up with a completely unique small project, designed totally from your creative side and your rotary cutter. We will explore as many improv techniques as possible in the time allowed. Embellishments of all types will also be discussed.




We will not have a Guild meeting in December. Happy Holidays!!

P&PQG WORKSHOP GUIDELINES

Workshop Guidelines:

- Workshop locations will be announced at a later date.
- Workshops are filled on a first-come, first-served basis and usually limited to 20-25 students depending on the speaker's requirements. A waiting list is kept for workshops that are filled.
- Supply lists will be available at the time of signup for the workshop.
- Full day workshops begin at 9 a.m. and end by 4 p.m. Half day workshops are normally from 9:00 a.m. until noon or 1 p.m. to 4 p.m. Participants need to arrive for class 30 minutes prior to the starting time.
- Workshops include a 30-45 minute lunch break. Workshop participants may bring a sack lunch or plan accordingly.

Payment and Enrollment:

• Full day workshops cost \$40.00 for guild members and \$45 for non-members. Half day workshops cost \$25.00 for guild members and \$30 for non-members.

- Payment is required at the time of registration and is nonrefundable.
- Registration forms are available here and from the Program chairperson.
- Payment is by cash or check made out to Pieces and Patches Quilt Guild of Jackson.
- The Program Committee requires a separate check for each month's workshop(s).

Workshop Cancellations:

In case of an emergency, workshop participants are responsible for transferring their workshop registration to other guild members. To facilitate this, one should contact the program chairperson to acquire names from a potential waiting list.

PPQG Challenge For 2021-2022

This year's challenge for our Guild will be Wearable Art. The definition of this is individually designed pieces of handmade clothing as an expression of art! Here are some of the rules

- 1. The item must be completed by entrant.
- 2. There must be some quilting involved.
- 3. You can take a previously made garment and create it to be art.
- 4. Cost will be \$5.00 to enter, and the word "artist" must be somewhere on the item. You can enter more than once, but each entry will cost \$5.00.

These entries can be coats, jackets, vests, dresses, etc. but also handbags, large bags, scarfs, hats...anything that you can wear or handle with your body.

Why did I choose this? I believe strongly we are all artists and when we make something to wear out in the world it shows we are artists. Many of us grew up with 4-H or home economics in school and have made garments. There are many simple patterns out there for all the above items. Our quilts/wall hangings stay in our homes or are given as gifts and Jackson doesn't see what great artists we have in this group. These articles can be made of old quilts made into jackets, applique, fabric paint, panels, machine embroidery, hand-made fabric, and/or embellishments. There are so many choices, and use all that you can imagine! You can look at Pinterest, YouTube or Instagram for inspiration. Make it fun! I will try to show ideas every month...this is a challenge to your art quilting ideas!

This challenge is not due until April so you have a lot of time to get something completed. I will be at the Guild meeting in October with some ideas and bring your \$5 to enter. This will be a special addition for our quilt show....THANK YOU, ARTISTS!


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Sharing Our Art A Story about Dena

"Give friend a quilt and she'll be happy for a few days. Teach that friend to quilt and she'll be happy for a lifetime!"

When I saw this quote, I thought of my friend Dena when I saw her coming into the quilt Guild 4 years ago. I hadn't seen her in many years because our lives hadn't crossed. She told me that another Guild member was teaching her and her daughter to quilt and she wanted to see what the Guild was all about.

The more she quilted the better she got and had even learned to quilt them herself. She lost her daughter last year from cancer and quilting took her mind from the tragedy. She started quilting for neighbors and friends. She called her friend that had started her on this journey many times to thank her for the gift she gave her of learning to quilt.

She loved learning new techniques and started putting more of her own ideas into the quilts. She was excited

for the holidays coming up and all the quilts she was making for gifts. This week she had a heart attack and had a few stints put in. Tragically she lost her life yesterday, but the gift her friend gave her filled her last years with joy and comfort.

We never know how others are affected. It is important to talk about and share our art. This experience tells me even more how we must share our gift and give back what we were given. Rest in Peace, Dena.

If everyone just made one quilt it would bring us close to last year's number. Think about it, and make this year another great year for these children!

Summary of Annual Report for PPQG for 2020-2021 year

The last 6 months of meetings of the Pieces and Patches Ouilt Guild for 2019-2020 year (March -August) were canceled because of the COVID-19 pandemic. No Guild meetings were held during that time, although the board continued to meet regularly, in-person through March and via Zoom April 2019 -June 2020. In September of 2020, it was decided to try virtual Guild meetings instead of not meeting at all or having in-person meetings. Though there were people who were adamantly against the idea of virtual meetings, we pushed forward with the idea and we found that the virtual Zoom meetings were very successful in keeping our Guild viable. In September of 2020, we started our first Zoom Guild membership meeting with just a 15-minute demo given by Cathey Newhouse, then took a vote about having virtual meetings and found that the great majority of people were in favor of trying virtual meetings. For each of the next several months we had a speaker present a program virtually and found it to be well-received. In October we had Nancy McNally present a trunk show and refer to her tutorial on her woven stars pattern.

November brought us Mary Bajcz who had prepared several tutorial videos just for our Guild on freecutting and curved piecing techniques. In January we did several member demos (still virtually), in February Cheri Pickett presented a program she called 'Ask your quilt for a Date'. In March Rhonda Dort presented an interesting program on the use of vintage linens in quilts. April brought us Barbara Eikmeier who talked to us (still virtually) about combining orphan blocks into beautiful quilts. In May, Janet Rochefort presented (yes, still virtually) a program on using Ricky Tims' Convergence technique and enhancing it with unique applique. In June we heard from Teri Lucas talking about color and thread in a program she called "Learning to Stitch with Reckless Abandon". July was our first in-person meeting in 17 months and it was our Challenge reveal. In August we enjoyed Deborah Richmond from the Quilted Turtle, telling about gadgets and tools for quilters.

Through all those months with only virtual contact with others in the Guild we were able to have many interesting and informative programs, we increased our membership numbers through those months, we enjoyed virtual show and tell slide shows, we learned to use and enjoy the members only private Facebook page, and we managed to stay somewhat connected with our quilting friends. Now that we are again meeting in-person, even though it is masked and with more socially distanced seating, it is becoming a little more like 'normal' times. Our membership numbers are once again climbing into the triple digits.

A number of our board members have worked hard to provide mechanisms for our Pieces and Patches members to remain in touch. Our sunshine chair. Pam Reinker remained active in her role in the Guild sending many get well, sympathy, and thinking-ofyou cards which she continued to send even during the pandemic months. Our hospitality person, Cheryl Navarre came up with a very creative way to give out door prizes even when we were not meeting in person Rebecca Turner, our Facebook for meetings. coordinator, created a members-only Facebook page where members can show their work and otherwise 'get together' virtually. We now have 75 members of that private page with many postings daily allowing members to remain in contact with each other. Our newsletter editor, Anna Pedrotte, has done a very fine job of creating a newsletter each quarter, providing yet another means of keeping in touch with other members. And our webmaster and director of communications, Karen Prater has done an amazing job of maintaining a current and well-managed website for our Guild. Karen also did a great job of helping members to learn and troubleshoot the Zoom program which was our venue for the virtual programs.

Retreats were held with fewer attendees and precautions like masks and spacing in place. The January and February retreats were held at Janet Rochefort's but with only 7 attendees. After the Inn was sold, retreats were held at a new venue in Tecumseh with 10 attendees and our being responsible for food. Cheryl Navarre, the retreat chair-person said that the new venue (and providing food instead of having it provided to us) still made for very successful retreats. Dates for future retreats in January, February, March, and August of 2022 have been set, all for the Tecumseh venue. Retreats are an excellent way to get to know others in the Guild and are LOTS of fun! Plan to sign up for a retreat in 2022!

Members of the executive board met monthly planning for future meetings, discussing and handling problems that came up, and other necessary business for successfully running the Pieces and Patches Quilt Guild during a sometimes quite unusual year. Recording secretary, Karen Clouse submitted minutes for board approval each month and treasurer, Janice Stitt submitted treasurer's reports each month, always balanced to the penny, and other officers fulfilled their duties as required. All in all, it was a difficult but very successful year in the life of the Pieces and Patches Quilt Guild.
