P&PQG WORKSHOP GUIDELINES

Workshop Guidelines:

- Workshop locations will be held at Country Stitches, 1965 Boardman Rd. Jackson, MI. Lunch is on your own. There is a refrigerator and microwave available if you want to bring a sack lunch.
- Workshops are filled on a first-come, first-served basis and usually limited to 20-25 students depending on the speaker's requirements. A waiting list is kept for workshops that are filled.
- Supply lists will be available at the time of sign-up for the workshop.
- Full day workshops begin at 9:30 a.m. and end by 4 p.m. Half day workshops are normally from 9:30 a.m. until noon or 1 p.m. to 4 p.m. Participants need to arrive for class 30 minutes prior to the starting time.
- Workshops include a 30-45 minute lunch break. Workshop participants may bring a sack lunch or plan accordingly.

Payment and Enrollment:

- Full day workshops cost \$40.00 for guild members and \$45 for nonmembers. Half day workshops cost \$25.00 for guild members and \$30 for non-members.
- Payment is required at the time of registration and is nonrefundable.
- Registration forms are available here and from the Program chairperson..
- Payment is by cash or check made out to Pieces and Patches Quilt Guild of Jackson.
- The Program Committee requires a separate check for each month's workshop(s).

Workshop Cancellations:

In case of an emergency, workshop participants are responsible for transferring their workshop registration to other guild members. To facilitate this, one should contact the program chairperson to acquire names from a potential waiting list.

Summary of Annual Report for PPQG for 2021-2022 Year Respectfully submitted by Cathey Newhouse

We started this fiscal year with masking and spacing requirements and no food due to COVID restrictions, but we still had our regular meetings in-person and face-to-face. The one exception was the January meeting which was canceled because all the staff members of the Ella Sharp Museum (our meeting venue) were sick with COVID. During the course of the year we progressed to having tables again and having masks recommended instead of required. The number of attendees was down, but increased throughout the year. We started the program year with 100 members; as of August 31, 2022 we had 120 members.

Our main source of funds is the quilt show held every two years. The income from a quilt show has traditionally provided operating expenses for 2 years. Since we could not hold a quilt show in 2021 because of COVID, we have been operating at a deficit. We are working hard to remove that deficit with the quilt show being held in October of 2022 and also with conserving funds in many ways. For more details on our financial status, please refer to the year-end financial report on the guild website.

Our calendar for the 21-22 year was as follows:

September – lecture and trunk show by Deborah Hyde

October - lecture on strip applique by Cathy Geier

And in October we had our first workshop in over two years: Cathy Geier teaching Strip Applique Landscapes

November – Kathy Schmidt did a lecture and workshop on quilting improv style

January – meeting was canceled but there was a workshop by Jean Dalton on Featherweight

Maintenance

February – Deb Strain showed how her artwork evolved into lovely fabric by Moda

March – Sheila Painter spoke on The World's Best Quilt Tips

April – Challenge Reveal for our Wearable Art challenge

May – Doris Larson gave a lecture and workshop on Pounded Flowers

June – A lecture and workshop on landscape art quilts by Janet Rochefort

July – Lyn Heilman spoke via zoom on different batting

August – Linda Thielfoldt did a trunk show and then a work shop on Taking the Fear out Of Ouilt as Desired

Other accomplishments of our guild this year included the introduction of monthly Open Sew days held at the Christoff and Sons community room. These days have been well received and enjoyed by many. Also, our guild has continued the members-only Facebook page, a very popular way for members to showcase their work and communicate safely with other guild members. A new group on vintage sewing machines was formed by Dawn Fowler and is also a very well-received new part of our guild.

Members of the executive board have met monthly and have fulfilled their jobs very competently. Thank you to each of them! Thank you, too, for those non-voting members of the board who are also working hard to fulfill their duties. Going forward, we hope to continue to provide programs and workshops that will allow our members opportunities to further learn about and enjoy quilting, to increase our guild's membership, to make up the projected financial deficit, and to find a venue for retreats that would allow us to increase our retreat participation.
